## IT'S PEAK HURRICANE SEASON!

Hurricane Ian turned me into a tropical storm tracker. As I write this Potential Tropical Cyclone Nine is heading our way. Instead of waiting for the local weatherman to tell me what might happen I log on to the internet and check three sites that the local weathermen source their reports from.

First up is <a href="https://www.nhc.noaa.gov">https://www.nhc.noaa.gov</a> where the best overviews of coming storms can be found. Their variety of images allow me to get a good picture of what may be coming our way and when it might get here.

Next up is a visit to <a href="https://www.cyclocane.com">https://www.cyclocane.com</a> where I can get a good look at the various track lines from the different hurricane models. The current consensus track runs through the Big Bend area, but the outlier track closest to us runs through Sarasota.

Finally, a visit to <a href="https://cera.coastalrisk.live">https://cera.coastalrisk.live</a> where details of potential storm surge are mapped in detail. Currently our area looks like we will see 3.5 to 4.5 surge, but areas in the river around the I75 bridge could see 4.5 to 5.5 feet.

In case you want to look to the past, visit NOAA Historical Hurricane Tracks <a href="https://oceanservice.noaa.gov/news/historical-hurricanes/">https://oceanservice.noaa.gov/news/historical-hurricanes/</a>. There you can look at more than 150 years of tracking data.

# SQUADRON EDUCATION OFFICER (SEO) SEO's Notebook: What Classes Should I Take?

This is a very legitimate question from someone trying to advance their boating knowledge and skill level. Of course, the answer depends on one's experience. So, I typically answer the question with more questions. How these follow-on questions are answered allows me to make suitable recommendations. Here are a few of the questions (in no particular order):

- 1. Do you have any boating experience in SW Florida?
- 2. Are you skilled in slow speed maneuvering?
- 3. Do you know how to use navigation aids?
- 4. Are you familiar with the difference between how navigation aids are used in the Intracoastal Waterway v. other marked channels?
- 5. What electronic navigation tools do you regularly use?
- 6. Can you operate your marine VHF radio effectively?
- 7. Can your first mate operate the vessel in case you cannot?
- 8. Do you operate your vessel outside of the sight of land (offshore)?

Other questions can (and do) pop up depending on how a given question is answered. At this point it becomes possible to recommend a boating education curriculum that would align with the boater's level of skill and experience. Individual training programs can then be constructed.

Nonetheless, there are some general guidelines that can be followed, and then customized as the need arises. I have crafted guidelines that are specifically directed to folks new to boating here in SW Florida. They can be broadly assigned into two categories. The first is either the absolute beginner boater or the experienced fresh water (lake, river) boater new to the area. The second is the experienced salt water boater, also new to the area. These two groups are going to have disparate skill and experience mixes, so their respective educational requirements would differ as well. For example, the first group will have limited exposure to things like the rules of road or navigation aids (beginner boaters will have none at all). The second group would likely be versed in the rules of the road, and have working familiarity with navigation aids and basic piloting.

So, let's say you're in the first group: no boating experience or experience limited to lakes and rivers. For you, boating training can be grouped into two major categories. The first consists of instruction in Basic Boating Safety and Seamanship. Two courses and two seminars are recommended. Foremost, is successfully completing the ABC course in basic boating safety and obtaining the State of Florida Boater Safety certification. Then reinforce what was covered in ABC with the six session Boat Handling course. These two courses alone provide the basic foundation that all recreational boaters should have. To round out this training, both the All About VHF/DSC Marine Radio and Weather for Boaters seminars should also be taken. The VHF radio is the second most important piece of safety gear on a boat, and all operators and first mates should be proficient in its usage. Understanding basic weather phenomena is also important to

ensure that boating activities are done safely. One cannot rely on the local weather forecasts alone, which, for around here, are notoriously inaccurate.

The other major training category is Piloting and Navigation. Navigation consists of techniques which allow you to determine your current location accurately. Piloting has the skills required to get your vessel from Point A to Point B safely. In our local waters, this can be challenging, if not outright daunting for those without the requisite training or experience. Both Piloting and Navigation are very broad and comprise a large skill set: familiarity with local waters through nautical charts, planning a cruise using a chart, and monitoring progress while cruising. One can obtain a solid foundation by taking a sequence of two seminars and two courses. The first is the SW Florida Boating Primer seminar. This provides both an historical overview, as well as some detailed geographical information in a two-hour session. This will segue into the Introduction to Charting seminar (essentially Chapter 5 of ABC). Here you'll be introduced to nautical charts and the use of digital tools (PC) for planning. Navigating SW Florida: Introduction to Navigation course. Over the course of six sessions, you receive great detail on how to navigate the local waterways using shipboard electronics (chart plotter), PC, tablets, and smart phones. Finally, the Marine Navigation course goes into the full details on how to do electronic navigation. Once you've completed this sequence of seminars and courses, you'll be able to plot a course and navigate almost anywhere locally, even if you've never been there.

If you happen to be an experienced salt water boating (Long Island Sound, Block Island Sound, Buzzard's Bay, Chesapeake Bay, Puget Sound, Catalina Channel, etc.), then your training for local waters need not be quite as extensive. Nonetheless, the two basic training categories remain the same. Typically, you'll have the requisite Boater Safety and Seamanship skills, so these courses and seminars are optional. However, if you do not currently hold a valid out-of-state National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) Boater Safety Certification, it is highly recommended that you take the ABC course and obtain the State of Florida Boater Safety Certification (Florida requires this for anyone born on or after January 1, 1988). Otherwise, ABC is optional. If it's been a while since you last took some basic seamanship, the Boat Handling course is an ideal refresher. Similarly for the VHF Radio and Weather seminars.

In the Piloting and Navigation category, the Introduction to Charting seminar is optional if you are already familiar with plotting and electronic navigation. Since you are new to boating in the area, the Navigating SW Florida: Introduction to Navigation is a must to gain some in-depth local knowledge. This is especially important if you've never cruised on the Intracoastal Waterway. You will need to understand this if your intent is to cruise the Caloosahatchee River and/or Pine Island Sound. Here, the navigation aids are interpreted differently than in other marked channels. Finally, for an in-depth treatise of electronic navigation techniques, the Marine Navigation course is extremely valuable.

For your convenience, I have included a matrix on the next page which covers all that was mentioned above. This should provide a little more clarity than just my somewhat terse narrative.

## **Seminar Sells Out!**



# Co-Op Charting Group Denny Pearson

The Co-Op Charting group is on a short break after completing the summer run season in August and the start of the next run season in November. The past summer season did present some challenges with morning weather conditions and the need to reschedule a number of the runs. The group did manage to reschedule and complete all 10 routes by mid August. The new Training Run Program was well received during the past season and will continue next season. The Training Runs are simulated ATON Verification Survey Runs focused on training crew positions during the simulated run and conducted on one of our river routes. Each new crew member receives training prior to, during, and after the training run.

The next Run Season starts in early November with the scheduling starting in October for a Route A (Royal Palm Yacht Club, Ft, Myers to Franklin Lock) run before November 15. ## **VESSEL SAFETY CHECK**

#### What is a Vessel Safety Check (VSC)?

It is an opportunity to have your vessel's safety equipment examined by a qualified vessel examiner of the United States Power Squadrons. There are NO fines, penalties, or reports to any other agency.

If your vessel is properly equipped, you will be awarded a current VSC decal to display. Decal display does NOT guarantee that you will not be boarded.

Provided you do not remove any equipment, you'll have peace of mind knowing you have the required equipment in an emergency and know where it's located in the event you need it or are inspected by boating law enforcement.

#### What are the benefits of a VSC?

The VSC can identify SAFETY and money saving opportunities:

- 1 By meeting federal, state, and local safety equipment requirements you will prevent equipment related citations.
- 2 You may receive a boating insurance discount from your insurance provider.
- 3 By increasing awareness of safety practices you may avoid accidents and costly breakdowns.
- 4 The VSC can reduce accidents by educating the boater about the value and use of safety equipment and safe practices on the water.

# You Need to Know Where the Manatees Are By Barret Bonden

According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service "Collisions with boats is the largest known source of mortality and accounts for approximately 25% of all documented manatee deaths recorded in Florida since 1976."

Manatees aren't confined to Manatee Park; we boat with them daily. If you live and boat here, there is no excuse for not knowing where the manatee protection zones are. Do you really need a sign to remind you of their existence? The speed limit signs throughout the county that mark these zones are still missing and may not be back anytime soon. Just because they are not there doesn't mean the manatee are gone and don't need protection.

The squadron has copies of the Lee County Boaters Guide. It's a simple guide that provides an overview of the manatee speed zones. If you don't have one, stop by the office and pick up a copy. You can view the guide on line at http://swflwaterways.com.

If you want a more detailed breakdown of the manatee areas visit www.myfwc.com and search for Manatee Protection Zones. There you will find all kinds of manatee information. Download the 6-page PDF file https://myfwc.com/media/7302/leempz-brammaps.pdf that shows you all of the federal and state manatee zones in Lee County and please share with your friends and neighbors. Let's make sure everyone knows the rules.

Currently law enforcement officials may not be issuing speeding tickets until the signs get back up. However, if you are breaking the law, don't be surprised if they stop you if you are speeding, and expect to receive a warning about your violation of the rules. Keep in mind that if you do not have a Vessel Safety Check sticker, law enforcement may decide to do a safety inspection and ask to see if you have all of the safety equipment on board.

#### Please help protect manatees

#### Look out for manatees

- Look and listen for manatees before starting your engine.
- Wear polarized sunglasses to reduce glare from the water.
- Watch for a manatee nose, back or tail.
- Look for a swirl or circular pattern on the surface of the water.

#### Conservation guidelines

- Comply with posted speed zones.
- Properly dispose of fishing line and garbage; never discard in the water.
- Do not feed or give water to manatees.

#### October is Fire Safety Month

America's Boating Channel video "Fire Extinguisher Regulations" offers an overview of the rules that separates commercial and recreational vessel fire protection requirements. It will help you learn how to ensure that all required portable fire extinguishers comply. Also featured are tips for preventing onboard fires in the first place.

If you need a refresher on classifications and carriage requirements for marine fire extinguishers, the channel offers a second video titled "Fire Extinguisher Standards." It offers tips for placing and servicing fire extinguishers, and explains the acronym PASS. Above all, ensure that the proper number of functional fire extinguishers are on board, readily accessible and that all responsible adults on board know to pull, aim, squeeze, and sweep.

U.S. Coast Guard approved marine-type fire extinguishers fully charged and in good and serviceable condition are required on recreational boats where the engines or fuel system could pose a fire hazard. Good and serviceable means that a fire extinguisher aboard a recreational vessel is properly charged and reads charged if it has a pressure gauge reading or charge indicator, that the extinguisher has a pin lock that is firmly in place, that it does not show visible signs of significant corrosion or damage and has a discharge nozzle that is clean and free from obstructions. Disposable dry chemical extinguishers expire 12 years after their date of manufacture, and rechargeable extinguishers expire annually unless maintained by a certified technician.
